A TIME OF GIVING

During this time of year, in the seasons of Christmass and Epiphany, we have the tradition of giving and receiving gifts. Families gather together to exchange presents with one another as signs of affection and gratitude.

Saint Nicholas, the bishop of Myra in the fourth century, is generally and almost universally acknowledged as the original embodiment of Santa Claus, one of the preeminent gift-givers of all modern time. In Germany, tradition holds that Nicholas places candies and other gifts in the shoes of good little children on Christmas Eve. In other European countries he bestows his favors on children in varied ways.

In the United States, Saint Nicholas was endowed with the name of **Santa Claus** and took upon him the vesture of the jolly old man in the Coco-Cola ads of the early 20th century who gives gifts according to an arbitrary system of "good and bad" children.

But neither Saint Nicholas nor Santa Claus is the origin of gift-giving. To Christians, the most incredible gift-giver is our heavenly Father, who gave us, at Christmas, his only Son to be our Redeemer and Salvation. No greater gift has ever—or will ever—be given.

Yet God, in his infinite wisdom, gives each of us, every year, a new gift that is beyond price. Every January first we are given the gift of a new year—a year in which we can begin anew on a road of closer fellowship with the Lord, a year of redemption for past failings, a year of renewed devotion in worship and prayer.

We Christians have the greatest gifts ever given to humankind. How do we respond to these gifts? How do we accept them? How do we put them into action?

We begin with prayer that we can be what God has called us to be, to be the people he has created in his own image, to be his messengers in this 21st century. It is by our witness to this broken and shattered world that we can show forth the greatest gift of all time—our salvation by a loving and caring and giving God.

Here is a recipe for Cheese-Vegetable Soup that Maxine would make for Rummage Sale and Greens Market lunches. I loved that soup and she gave me the recipe written out in her tidy printing. Here it is:

Cheese-Vegetable Soup: Maxine Collins

- 1 quart water
- 4 chicken bouillon cubes
- 2 cups diced celery
- 2 cups chopped onions (small bite size pieces)
- 2 1/2 cups chopped potatoes (small bite size pieces)
- 1 bag California-blend frozen vegetables (cauliflower, broccoli & carrots)
- 2 cups Cream of Chicken soup (2 cans)
- 1 pound Velveeta cheese (cut into cubes or slices)
- 1 cup milk (optional)

Dissolve bouillon in water, add all vegetables and cook for 30 minutes

Add soup and cheese (stir to melt the cheese)

Add milk if too thick (Maxine always added at least a 1/2 cup)

Simmer for a few minutes and serve.

The Saint James night to serve and Chaperone at the Grosse Ile Presbyterian Church, will begin at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Dec. 21 and will go through the night until 7 a.m. Please talk to **Jane Colwell** or **Sue Lowery** if you can help. Also, the people will be there all day on Christmas day and it seems that all the churches may be needed on that day. Let Jane know if you can be of help then as well.

Remember, Mary & Joseph were looking for a place to stay too. We can offer them a safe haven to sleep and eat, which is the heart of Christmas. Please keep Debbie in your prayers.
